



Top Accomplishments: FY19

GCI Partners with South Carolina DOC to Produce Metal Cuff Ports:

The Metal Plant located at Walker State Prison was tasked with producing cuff ports. These ports are made of ¼" steel with a 1" steel hinge. The parts are cut and then formed on a machine that can easily bend heavy steel. The parts are then welded together and ground smooth so they are robust enough to withstand the rigors of prison life.

GCI has produced over 5,000 cuff ports for South Carolina DOC. The order shipped 1,000 ports every 3 months. One of the biggest benefits of this order is that it qualifies as a PIECP (Prison Industry Enhancement Certification Program) order. This program allows offenders to be paid a prevailing wage as it compares to similar jobs in the community. A total of 120 offenders have been able to benefit from this PIECP order equating to 13,413 work hours to complete the project. GCI continues to strive to increase PIECP job opportunities for offenders and hopes to partner with other states on future projects.

GCI and GDC Partner to Open Wood Store at Ware State Prison:

The Wood Store was inspired by Governor Nathan Deal and Commissioner Greg Dozier's vision to showcase the talent and skill-sets learned by offenders while incarcerated. The store opened to the public on October 1, 2018. The store displays wood crafts voluntarily created by offenders through the pursuit of a hobby or recreational activity while incarcerated. Items available for purchase include rocking chairs, corn hole boards, step stools, cutting boards, bird houses, designer bowls, checker boards, and much more. Proceeds will benefit the Correctional Peace Officers Foundation and the offenders who created the crafts.

GDC's Officers' New Uniform Implementation:

GCI and Georgia Department of Corrections (GDC) Care and Custody Division partnered to develop and implement a new Correctional Officer Uniform for the Department of Corrections. Following the recommendations of a uniform wear test committee, GDC identified the uniform components and utilized GCI to add customization to the uniforms making them unique to the department. Care and Custody conducted a statewide employee sizing campaign in order to expedite orders to GCI for each Correctional Officer. GCI constructed a new production line at its Garment Production Plant, located at Pulaski State Prison. This allows GCI to accommodate the volume of customization orders from GDC. GCI began delivering uniforms to Care and Custody in July of 2018. Currently, all GDC facilities have received an initial shipment providing uniforms to over 5,000 employees. Moving forward, Care and Custody and GCI will continue collaborating to provide uniforms for cadets, promotions, size changes, wear and tear, and rehire needs for the department.

GCI Supports Community Needs During Hurricane Michael:

GCI is one of the few agencies within the state that has emergency feeding capabilities. GCI, along with a number of other agencies, is available to assist Georgia Emergency Management Agency (GEMA) when called upon. The aftermath of Hurricane Michael, was one of these instances. GCI provided support for GDC by providing mobile kitchen support to ensure there was no interruption in meal service to offenders. GCI was also contacted to send the mobile kitchen, generator and water tanker to Albany, GA to support GEMA and Salvation Army efforts to feed first responders. GCI staff was on site to assist with set up and training of volunteers. GCI was also contacted to provide food and supplies to support the Department of Defense mobile kitchen in Colquitt, Georgia, as well as Donalsonville, Georgia to support GEMA and the Salvation Army. GCI is honored to be able to support our communities in their time of need and will continue to be prepared for future requests.

On-the-Job Training (OJT) programs were successfully added to our Agribusiness Operations during FY19. One of our training programs was added to Rogers Farm Canning Plant in Reidsville, where we can approximately 200,000 cases of vegetables per year.

During FY19, 36 offenders completed OJT at the Canning Plant. Offenders learn how to sort and grade vegetables; trim, peel and slice products; use processing equipment; and process items according to specifications.

In February, GCI decided to follow the lead of Utah Correctional Industries; their effort to provide much needed backpacks for school-age children in their state was featured in the January NCIA E-brief. What started out as a small group, with great ideas, turned into a much larger group with grand ideas and innovative ways to achieve them.

Through a combined effort involving staff at the Decatur office, with staff and offenders at Montgomery, Hancock and Pulaski plants, we have been able to realize our goal. Surplus fabric from Montgomery Upholstery and GCI vendor donations made for great colorful backpack flaps. Hancock Embroidery provided the GCI logo and sentiment "Excellence Drives Success" on each flap. Everything came together beautifully at hands of staff and offenders at Pulaski Garment where all of the components were assembled. From the first cut of the patterned fabric to the final snip of errant thread, and at every step in the process, it was evident from finished goods that everyone put in their best effort.

A total of 500 backpacks were delivered to Jerry Kellar, Program Director for DeKalb Access and Resource Center, part of Georgia DFCS, in July. Mr. Kellar and his staff worked with other community partners to fill each backpack with school supplies. The backpacks were distributed by DFCS at back-to-school events in DeKalb and Fulton counties. Each county received 250 backpacks for distribution.

Each and every offender assigned to GCI's Hancock Embroidery and Pulaski Garment operations signed acknowledgment waivers to be able to work on the project; which was a completely voluntary project. This speaks volumes to the positive impact GCI is having on those assigned to our operations.

One offender who worked on the project said "My kids said they were proud of me when I told them what I was working on."

The Engraving Department is located on the second floor of the Decatur office and mainly produces trophies, awards and plaques. As of late, the Engraving Department has incorporated into the department the production and selling of promotional items such as key chains, cups, coffee mugs, tumblers and banners with the assistance of the Screen Plant. The Engraving Department currently has a contract with the City of Atlanta and services all Clayton County Parks and Recreation. In addition to providing awards for two of the major cities in the Metro area, the Engraving Department also provides merit and retirement awards for all state, county and city agencies including MARTA, and the new city of Stonecrest.

The department is headed by Lakethia Tolen (Plant Manager) and Kizzy McKinley (Supervisor). There are two residents from the Atlanta Transitional Center (ATC) assigned to the department who participate in on-the-job-training. The residents get hands-on training in graphic design using Corel Draw, small press operations, wood cutting and wood assembly.

Since January 2019, the Engraving Department has produced over 60,000 trophies, awards, plaques and promotional items. The most recently acquired equipment is the sublimation mug press. The sublimation press allows the Engraving Staff to dye sub (a chemical/gas heat transfer process)on materials such a plastic, aluminum, acrylic and fabric. With this equipment, the department was able to produce 500 full color mugs in three days for the Women's Department of Veterans Services.

A Day at Central Office



"Safety is no Accident"

Working in corrections is like no other industry. Security is the culture. Security greets you at the front gate with metal detectors, body scans, opening bags and emptying pockets. Everything you see, do or touch while inside is security related. It's a culture.

Safety in our workplace should be no different. Every operation within CI, from operating equipment to sweeping floors, should have the same emphasis on safety.

Creating a culture where safety is paramount requires a Health and Safety Program where everyone from executive management, to front line supervisors and offenders working the equipment are a part of the program.

Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has published its new "Recommended Practices for Health and Safety Programs". In the publication OSHA states "traditional approaches were often reactive, and problems were addressed only after a worker was injured. The main goal today of a safety and health program is to prevent workplace injuries, illnesses, and deaths; as well as, the suffering and financial hardship these events can cause the workers, their families, and employers".

In Georgia, newly assigned offenders are given orientation training consisting of, right to know and Georgia Correctional Industries (GCI) Safety Policy. Each offender is then given in-depth safety training for the operation he/she will be performing. This training consists of machine specific safety procedures and Job Safety Analysis (JSA). All training is documented and placed in the offenders file. Each year the offenders receive refresher training on all machine specific safety procedures and JSAs. In addition to the training, GCI conducts weekly safety talks/meetings with offender staff where subjects such as: machine guarding, proper lifting, hand safety, PPE, etc. are discussed. Offenders are required to attend these meetings and are encouraged to participate in the discussion.
